Day of Giving 2014

Grace Christian School is participating in the fourth annual Armstrong County Day of Giving. The date is May 8th and it is a one day only event. Armstrong County Community Foundation has set aside this one day to raise as much money as possible for non-profit organizations. Any individual monetary donations from 20 dollars to 5,000 dollars will be matched by the Armstrong County Community Foundation. The amount of money that is matched to every donation will depend on the total amount raised by the group of non-profits. This year, the school is working with Cornerstone Consulting Group in an attempt to raise 30,000 dollars (last year the school made 18.302.69 dollars total). Parents, staff and directors have been asked to commit to sending out letters containing the Day of Giving details to at least 25 people and to doing a follow-up call to the same people. Statistics show that a follow-up call increases the potential of a donation by 300 percent. On April 8th, all the letters were prayed over before they were mailed; the school recognizes that God is the One who can truly increase the donations given. By doing all of this, the school hopes that each family will be able to raise at least 1,500 dollars and together be able to reach their larger goal.

There are three ways to donate. Preferably, it is done by a check or money delivered to GCS before May 8. The

check must be made out to "Armstrong County Community Foundation" and "Grace Christian School" must be in the memo box, also the date on the check must be May 8, 2014. Second, it can be done by a check (made out as stated above) or money mailed to 160 N. McKean St., Kittanning, PA 16201. Third, it can be done online; go to www.Armstrong Gives.org. Remember, this is a one day event, so if done online, it must be done on May 8th or if mailed it must be post marked on May 8th.

With your help and prayers, GCS can meet its goal of 30,000 dollars. All the money raised will go to the McGrady Memorial Fund for Advancement of Christian Education.
